March 1, 2019 “Indigenous Culture in the Music Classroom” Sarah Nickonchuk

Integrating Indigenous culture is not just for social studies teachers! There exist rich possibilities for music that enhance musical skills and concepts, as well as integrate literacy through an Indigenous lens. This workshop will present various ways that teachers and students can explore Indigenous culture and worldviews through music and movement. Teachers will leave with ready-to-use lesson ideas, songs, further resource suggestions and the confidence to integrate Indigenous perspectives into their music classroom. This workshop will focus primarily on curricular outcomes from K-6, but teachers of all grades stand to benefit from the material presented.

Presenters

Ardelle Ries, DMus, MMus, BMus, Associate Professor/Music

An Associate Professor of Music at the University of Alberta Augustana Faculty, Ardelle teaches musicianship, theory, conducting, and choral literature classes. She conducted The Augustana Choir for a decade and founded Mannskor: Augustana's Men's Choir in 2006. A staunch advocate for Canadian choral music, Ardelle has commissioned and premiered new choral works from established and emerging Canadian composers that The Augustana Choir has performed in national and international settings. With a strong musical and pedagogical foundation established at the Zoltán Kodály Pedagogical Institute in Hungary, Ardelle has been on faculty as an aural musicianship specialist at the Kecskemét Kodály Conservatory, the 2005 International Kodály Seminar, Wilfrid Laurier University, the University of Calgary, and the University of Alberta Faculty of Education. Her dissertation, *The Child Voice: A Social Context* was nominated for a Governor General's Dissertation award in 2004 and again in 2005 for the Association of Canadian Choral Conductor's Dissertation Award. Current research projects include choral improvisation as well as the history and current practice of Kodály-based education in Canada. Ardelle served on the board of the Alberta Choral Federation and was the 2013 recipient of the Richard S. Eaton Award of Distinction in recognition of exemplary service to choral music in the province of Alberta. Ardelle is an advisor for the Alberta Kodály Association, serves on the board of directors for the Kodály Society of Canada, and was the chair of the Singing the Circle: International Kodály Symposium 2017 organizational committee.

Sarah Nickonchuk

Sarah Nickonchuk has taught all subject areas from grades K-10 with three different school boards. She currently teaches grade 6 French Immersion homeroom and division 1 music in French at Good Shepherd School in Peace River, AB. She will be completing her Masters of Education in December 2018 with a focus on music education and cultural studies. In her studies and professional work, Sarah has focused on integrating indigenous perspectives into the classroom. This has led her to learn with and from indigenous teachers, community members, and scholars. In her free time, she enjoys cooking and running with her husband, and chauffeuring around her three children to their long list of extra-curricular activities.
