

Her research has evolved to explore parents' sense of community with their children's schools, and she is particularly interested in rural schools. Dr. Stelmach is a member of the Canadian Association for the Study of Educational Administration, a national academic association and supervises doctoral students pursuing varying interests in school leadership.
